Daniel H. McNulty, president and manager of the Telephone Repair Co., Chicago, Ill., announced recently that the company had been incorporated on December 1, 1943 and that it is now operating under the name of Telephone Repair Co., Inc. He stated the address of the company's headquarters remains the same—1760 W. Lunt St., Chicago (26), Ill.—and that there would be no changes in management.

Mr. McNulty stated that the company was incorporated in order to provide adequate financing to expand the company's facilities to meet present and post-war demands for its products and services.

Mr. McNulty organized Telephone Repair Co. in 1926 after having spent 23 years in telephone work. He started his telephone career with Western Electric Co. in 1885, remaining with that company for a few years. Up until World War I, he was associated with Bell and Independent operating companies in plant super-

After leaving the Army, he became associated with the Premier Electric Co. and remained with that company until forming Telephone Repair Co., the headquarters of which have grown from a one-room garage to a plant with 15,000 square feet of floor space, most of the expansion taking place within the last eight years.

Bell Man Awarded DSC for Heroism

Lt. Lewis N. Ellis of Chattanooga, Tenn., former office manager for the Southern Bell Telephone & Telegraph Co. recently was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, the second highest Army valor award for "distinguished service" he and his Liberator group made in low-level bombing on the Rumanian oil fields at Ploesti in August, 1943.

The award was presented by Brig. Gen. Edward Timberlake, commanding general of a Liberator bomb wing "somewhere in England." Lieutenant Ellis also holds the Air Medal with three oak leaf clusters.
